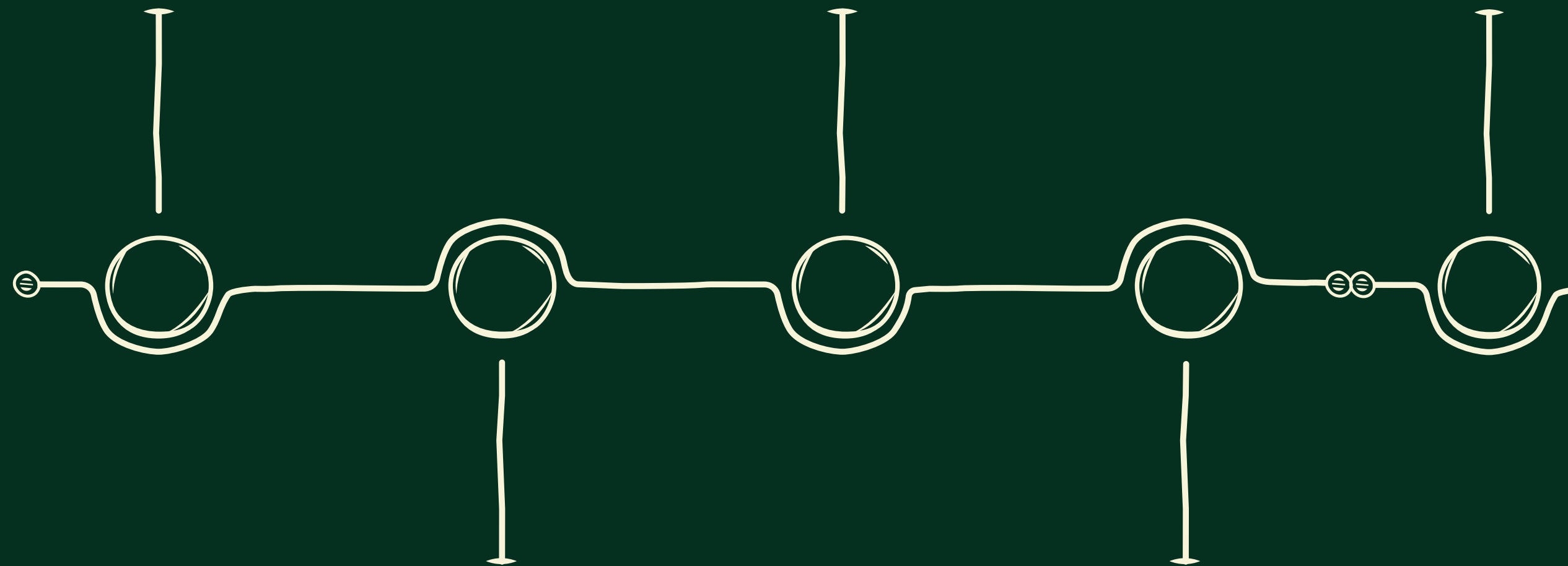

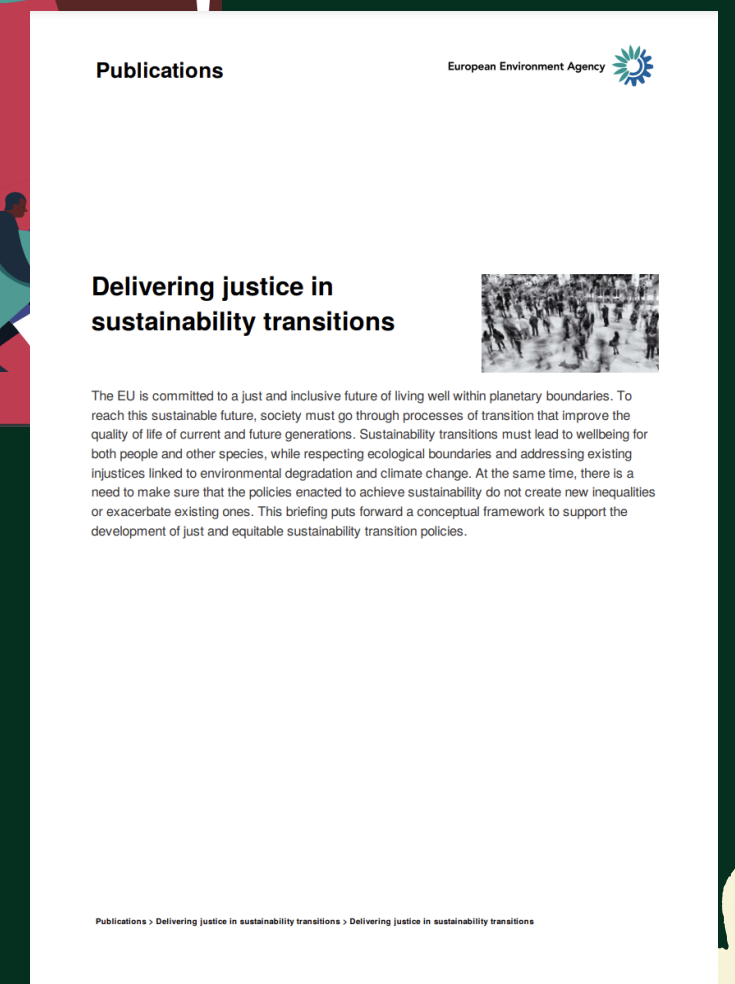


Climate Justice draft definition



Inputs based on theoretical and policy briefings and societal practices:

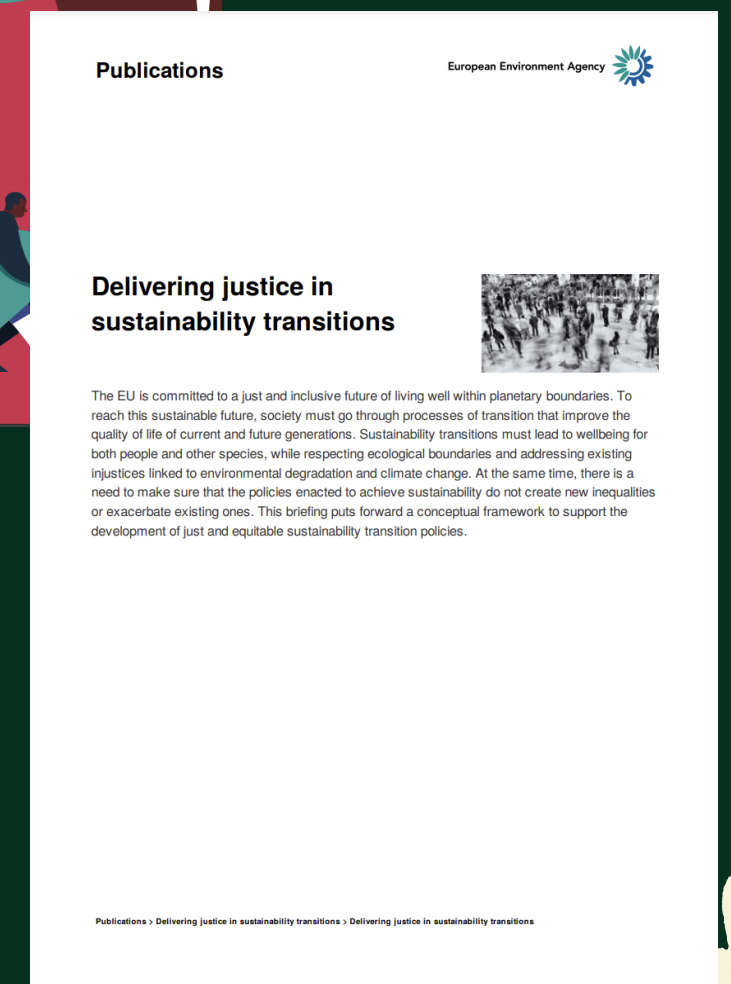
- Existing resources (e.g. reports Netherlands Scientific Council for Government Policy (WRR) & European Environmental Agency)

Climate Justice draft definition

Themes emerged relate to theoretical concepts of climate justice, e.g.:

- **Recognitional justice:** are all groups, and especially vulnerable or marginalized groups recognized, considered and involved?
- **Distributive justice:** are risks/costs and benefits fairly divided?
- **Restorative justice:** are previous wrongs corrected or compensated?
- **Structural justice:** are systemic barriers addressed?
- **Procedural justice:** are decision making processes fair and inclusive, with consideration of all interests?



Climate Justice draft definition



Based on the survey and theory

Climate justice aims to ensure fairness in avoiding and addressing the consequences of climate change, **biodiversity loss** and ecological breakdown. **This should occur** through an inclusive process that **equally** considers the interests, needs, risks, capabilities, **opportunities and vulnerabilities** of everyone and everything (human and non-human). **Now, and in the future.**



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Examples of related questions:

- *Who is disproportionately affected by the climate crisis? (location, generation, not belong to x norm, environment, animals/biodiversity)*
- *Who influences and takes decisions? For whom are our policies made? Whom do they exclude?*
- *Who benefits from certain polities, who might be worse off, and how can this be addressed?*
- *Who/what is the cause of harms to health and wellbeing, and what is their role in*



Climate Justice draft definition



Based on the survey and theory

Other themes and considerations mentioned (at times contradicting, please consider these in your group discussions):

- *Not exacerbating inequality vs. tackling inequality*
- *Take these into account in co-benefits, mitigation and adaptation measures*
- *Inequality pre climate crisis/due to climate crisis/inequality in measures*
- *Those responsible pay*
- *Systemic vs more individualized/local climate justice measures*



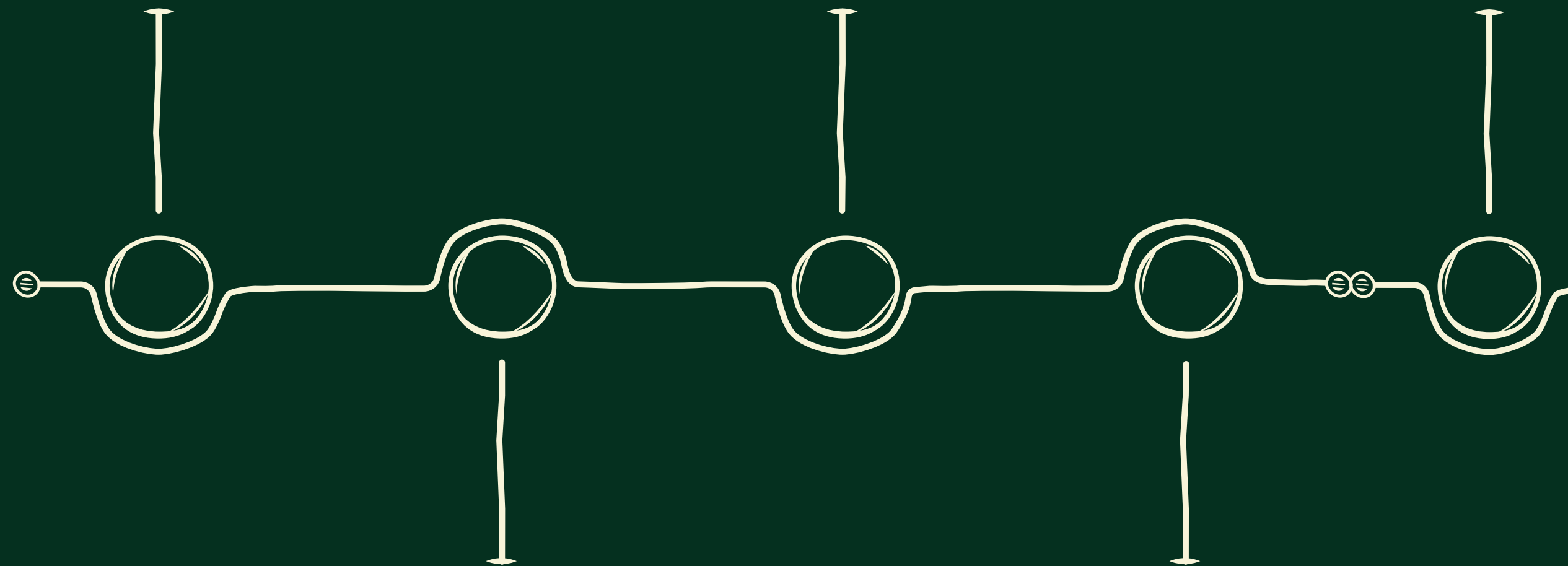

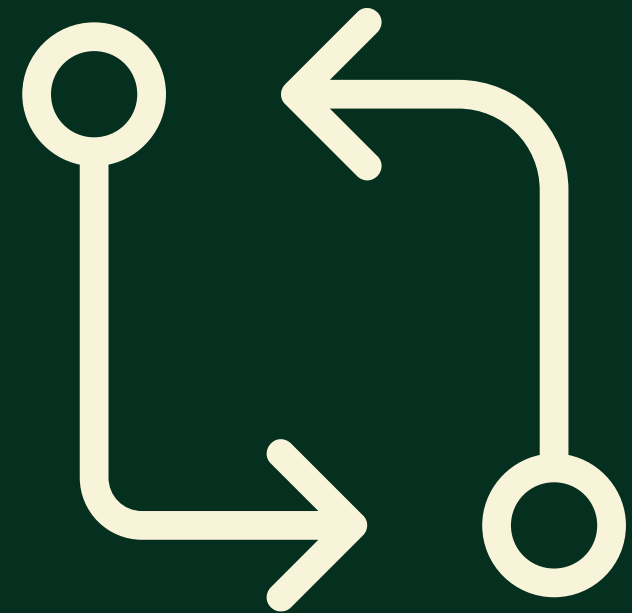
